





HUMAN NATURE REPEATS ITSELF - HISTORY DOES NOT Part 2 of 2 (the first part was in the Apr-Jun Journal) By Rodney Bobak



I would now like to trace the eagle in Western Europe's lineage. As the Roman Empire fell in 476 AD to barbarian tribes from the east, the old Roman nobility intermarried with the Tribal leadership to create a new ruling aristocracy. The only entity carrying on Roman learning, organization and language was the Catholic Church. By 800 AD the Frankish Kingdom, led by Charlemagne (Figure 1), had untied most of Western Europe. This dude towered over his subjects at 6 foot 4 inches, since most everybody was 5 foot 2 inches! Pope Leo III crowned Charlemagne, "Chuck" to his friends, as Holy Roman emperor and successor to the old Empire's authority. This was the "1st Reich" or Empire.

He chose an eagle banner as his symbol, but his coinage didn't reflect this device. His Denier coins (Figure 2), based upon the Denarius of Rome, were rather simplistic and bland-close to 6th grade art class-with no eagle. His descendants split up his realm, which was re-assembled in the German part by Otto I, who took up the title of Holy Roman Emperor. His and his descendants took up the Imperial Eagle (Figure 3), but not on their coins; eagles were still too hard to do by Western minters. The Hohenstaufen (can you say that fast three times while patting your head and hitting the delete key?) Dynasty followed Otto's kin, but were also unable to place eagles on coins.

It took the Hapsburg Dynasty to finally put the eagle on their legal tender, but their eagle was double-headed and started its appearance "after" the Byzantine Empire fell to the Turks.

A case can be made that the Hapsburgs wanted to "cash in" on the authority of the Eastern Emperors by using the two-headed bird. Except for an ever-changing Coat of Arms on its chest, this eagle doesn't change much from the late 15th to the late 19th Centuries (Figures 4, & 5). The Holy Roman Empire's influence in Central Europe, especially the 300 large and small German States, withered away until it became a title without poser after the Thirty Years War (1618-1648). The emperor controlled only his hereditary lands in Austria and whatever else Austria had. In German, Austria is "Osterreich" or East-Kingdom, because it was Charlemagne's eastern-most defense of his realm. The

most enduring coin of the Austrian Empire is the Maria Theresa Thaler (Figure 6). Although the eagle must now sport a pairing of her and her husband's Coat of Arms (she can't be Holy Roman Emperor, but she still wears the pants in the family), all the devices and titles are the same as previous issues.





Maria Theresa recued the Austrian Empire from near destruction and the country chose to honor her by continuously minting her last coin of 1780, when she died. One can only guess the age of M.T. Thaler....232 years (Figure 7) or last year. They are beautiful coins.

Her successors changed little in the design of the eagle except for the style and length of the feathers and the ever-evolving Coat of Arms due

feathers and the ever-evolving Coat of Arms due to royal marriages. When the 300 German States to the north and west of Austria (There was no Germany, just a bunch of Germanys) were consolidated by Napoleon into 30 States, several had eagles on their coinage, but no one claimed Imperial Authority. With the birth of a united German Empire, or 2nd Reich, based upon Prussia in 1871, the world saw a one-headed German Eagle (Figure 8) appear with just a crown. When the German and Austrian Empires collapsed after WWI, both new republics, which followed, sported much hum-



bler eagles with one head (Figure 9).

PUT SOME FUN BACK INTO YOUR COLLECTING... **BILL FIVAZ**

If you're sick and tired of trying to cope with the grading hassle and feel about ready to chuck the whole shooting match and start collecting 19th Century Peruvian bottle caps (unslabbed, of course), let me try to convince you to consider collecting something a little offbeat (Peruvian bottle caps aren't?), but at the same time very accessible.

If you're a collector ... I mean really a collector, how about assembling a W.W.T.S. (World's Worst Type Set). I started this rather bizarre experience about 20 years ago, and I gotta tell you, I've had an absolute ball! The idea is, as the title implies, to obtain the absolute worst specimen of every type of U.S. coin you can find. Now, realizing that "worst" like incest, is a relative term, you will have to decide early on if you want to qualify it to mean worst by virtue of wear only, worst by damage and/or wear, worst by having a hole in it, or what.

And it's not kosher to "manufacture" one yourself just to fill in a hole—no fair hammering an otherwise collectible specimen just to render it uncollectible for your set. The coins must be just as you find them in junk boxes, cull corners, or even in circulation.

You haven't lived until you've seen the look on a dealer's face when ask to see his "throw-away" box of dogs and then reject most of them because they're "too nice". It's also fun to explain to him that you're working on a set that you need to downgrade, and you want some "real nice bad ones" to plug in.

My collecting M.O. for my set is that any type of wear or damage is fair game, as long as you can tell with certainty what the type is. In other words, you have to be able to see the arrows and date on a Liberty Seated coin for that opening, but who cares if a Barber Half has a date?

Obviously, the earlier type will be very tough to find, but you'll soon realize that the late date clad coinage is equally as scarce. As I said, this is collecting in its purest form, and I guarantee that you'll enjoy the heck out of it while at the same time satisfying that savage collector instinct. You won't have to spend the kid's inheritance to put together a presentable (?) set of these "once UNC" or "was BU" beauties.

If you want to specialize and concentrate on a certain series like Large Cents or Commemoratives, have a go at it ... it's entirely you to you. **Enjoy!!**

At this point, I must say that Napoleon Bonaparte, while Emperor of France, declined to assume the trappings of the Roman Empire; he chose to link his reign with the Roman Republic and directed the artistic energies of numerous French artists, Jacques David being a major one, in that direction. His great-nephew, Napoleon III, did use the Roman Eagle (one-headed variety) on the coins of the 2nd Empire (Figure 10). Hitler used the German Republic's Eagle, but linked the glorious past to his administration with the use of the phrase "Third Reich" (Figure 11). Last. but not the least of the borrowers, was "The Chin", Benito Mussolini. He drew heavily from Roman iconology, but his propaganda machine utilized postage more readily than coinage (Figure 12).

Iclose with two examples of folks, who didn't want to be linked with Rome. The Poland claims the hero, Lech, founded the nation around the year 800 AD. He saw an eagle in the morning and thought it would be a nifty symbol (Figure 13). The fact that Russia, Austria and Germany, who have surrounded Poland and taking turns beating her up for centuries, all sport eagles is just coincidence. Then there is the strange Kingdom of Albania. This country's symbol was the doubleheaded eagle (Figure 14), which they claim has nothing to do with the Byzantine Empire even though they were part of it for over 1200 years. Albanian legend says a hunter was blessed by an eagle, whose eaglet he had saved. From hence we get Shqiperia or Albania, the land of Eagles! Personally, I've never seen a double -headed eagle flying about. I, however, haven't been to Chernobyl since the accident in 1986.
